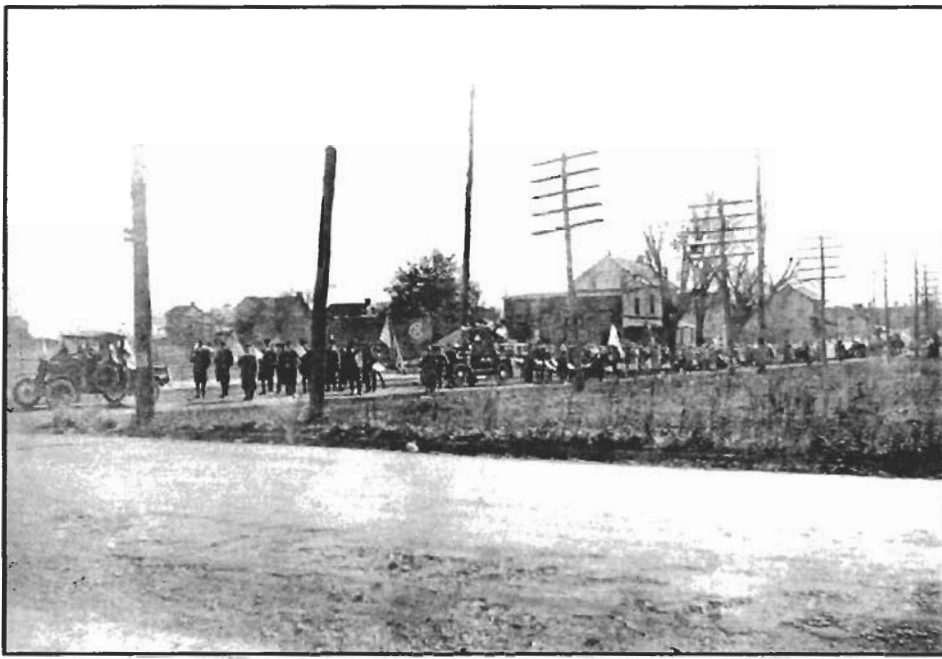

Mystery Photo #1 (left)

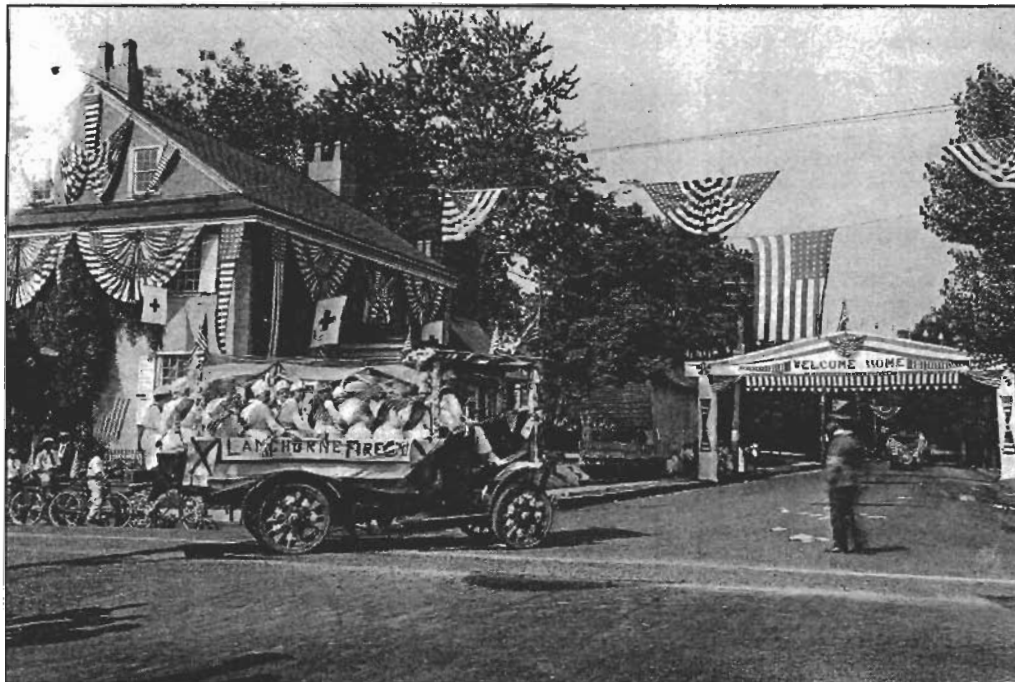
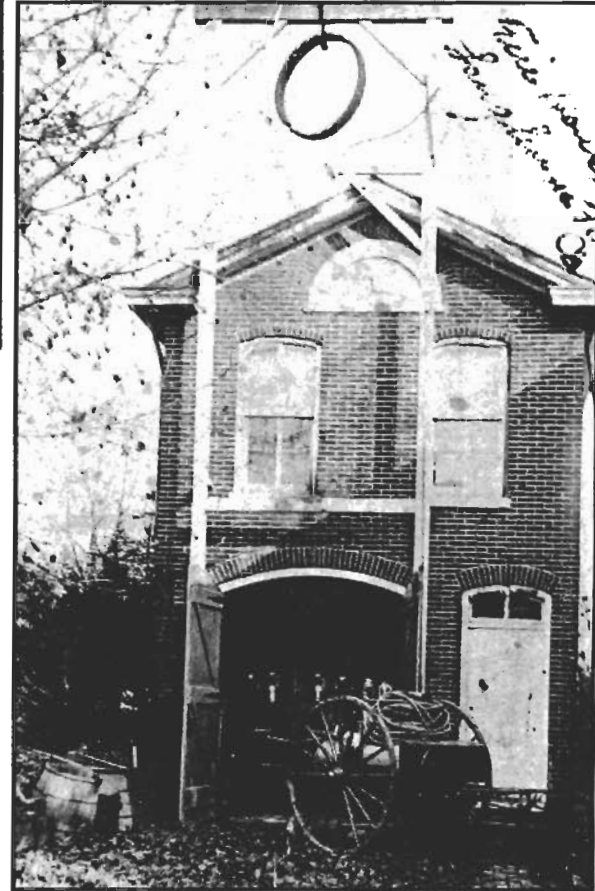

ARE THESE NAMES ALL CORRECT? Thursday, April 14, 1921

The committee in charge of the purchase of the bronze tablet bearing the names of the ex-service men of Langhorne, Langhorne Manor, South Langhorne and Middletown Township, has about completed its work so far as the listing of the names is concerned, and the order will be placed in the hands of the manufacturer early next week, and it is expected that work will be started at once on engraving the names on the bronze tablet. Naturally, when once there they will be permanent and the committee is very desirous of getting the list entirely correct. The list as it now stands is given below. MEMORIAL DAY PLANS ARE PROGRESSING Thursday, April 28, 1921

The committee composed of delegates from the American Legion of Langhorne, the O. of I. A. of South Langhorne and the P. O. S. of A. of Hulmeville met again at South Langhorne on Monday night and made further plans for the Memorial Day exercises. Speakers of note have been secured, and the Red Hill Band engaged for the occasion. Invitations will be sent to the schools, borough officials and organizations to take part in the celebration. The exercise at Langhorne will be held in the morning, when the Memorial Building will be dedicated and the new bronze monument containing the names of boys from the community who served in the war will be unveiled. Following the usual Memorial Day exercise in Langhorne, the regular plan will be followed out a Hulmeville in the afternoon.

MEMORIAL DAY PLANS IN LANGHORNE Thursday, May 19, 1921

The people of Langhorne, Langhorne Manor, South Langhorne and Hulmeville Boroughs and Middletown Township are delighted with the beautiful Community House and Park which are about completed and are arranging for the dedication on Memorial Day.

The program will start about 9 o'clock with a parade which will end at the Community House, where the exercises will start with presentation of the flagpole, which is a gift from the children of our community, and will be placed in the park. The National colors will be raised on the pole for the first time.

A large bronze tablet containing the names of all of the men from the community who were in the War Services of the country during the Great War is being procured and will be dedicated as part of the ceremonies.

MEMORIAL DAY IN LANGHORNE Thursday, May 26, 1921

The Memorial Day celebration in Langhorne this year promises to be one of the greatest events of the year. The program, which is under the supervision of the American Legion Post, will be inaugurated with the parade of all local ex-service men at 9:30 A.M. Following this, the Memorial Building will be dedicated and the service tablet unveiled.

For the dedication, the post has been most fortunate in obtaining the Honorable J. W. Meekins, Congressman from North Carolina who is now directing the work of the Council of Alien Property. The Hon. Henry W. Watson, Congressman from this district, will preside at the unveiling of the tablet. The Post Commander, Samuel L. Ridge, will officiate for the legion. Luncheon will be served by the Ladies' Auxiliary to all legion men parading.

Early in the day, a detail from the Post will proceed to Newtown, where the grave of Private Tom O'Sullivan will be properly marked and decorated. In the afternoon the Legion men will meet at the South Langhorne Fire House and will parade to Hulmeville to help in the celebration there.

On Sunday, May 29th, the Legion and all other ex-service men will assemble at the Episcopal Church in Langhorne at 7:30 P.M. and will attend the evening service in a body. Uniforms will not be worn.

The Post wishes to take the opportunity to express its appreciation for the very substantial support which it has received in conducting its dances. The last on May 21st at the Bucks County Country Club was highly successful.

MEMORIAL DAY BIG SUCCESS Thursday, June 2, 1921

Notwithstanding the cloudy skies which threatened rain at almost any time. Langhorne's Memorial Day celebration was a great success from every point of view. The parade was participated in by the Grand Army, American Legion, Women's Auxiliary, firemen, lodge members and children, all making a fine showing.

The program was carried out as announced in these columns last week. Following the parade a flag was raised on the Community House grounds, Senator Buckman presiding and Rev. Mr. Booth offering prayer and speaking, Chief Burgess Osterhout unfurled the flag. At the Community House, Senator Buckman presided, and gave a history of the association in charge of the Building. Alfred M. Wildman made the dedicatory address, and a stirring speech was given by Congressman J. W. Meekins of North Carolina. Dr. S. L. Ridge, Commander, spoke of the American Legion Post and Mrs. Edgar Hires for the Red Cross. Congressman Watson presided at the unveiling of the tablet bearing the names on the "honor roll" of the community.

Computer Fund Success !

A donation update from VP Larry Langhans

A hearty thank you to everyone who so far has contributed to our Computer Fund Challenge. As you may remember from a letter that was sent out in February, a generous HLA supporter has offered to match up to a total of \$2000.00 contributions from members in an effort to raise money to purchase new computers, printers, scanners and other technology. The new equipment will be used to catalogue, preserve and make available to researchers and the community the extensive collection of books, photographs, maps and other material in our holdings. As of March 14, thirty-three members and friends have contributed an amazing \$3210.00. This amount includes several large donations. Together with the matching \$2000.00 that has been given, we now have a total of \$5210.00.

We have already purchased a new Dell Laptop computer and printer and are using them in the balcony to record new archive donations. This is part of a long on-going process in an effort to catalogue all of our holdings and have them searchable by computer. The laptop will also be used to take programs that Charlie Lauble has created from our collection of photographs out to the community. We next expect to purchase a computer for visitors to use in viewing the many photographs and documents that have already been scanned. We will keep you informed of our progress using the new 21st century technology at our Historic Association!

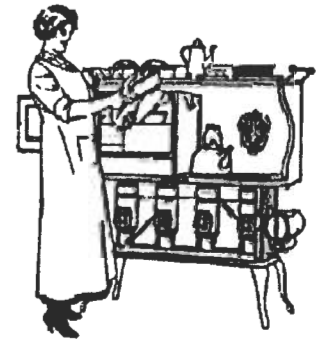

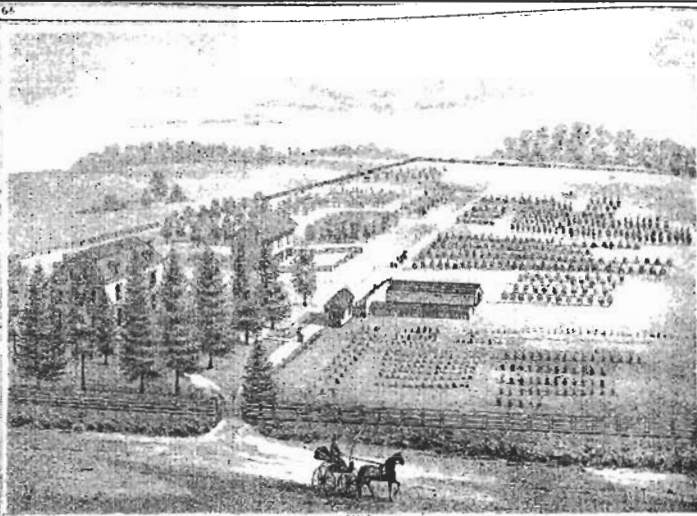

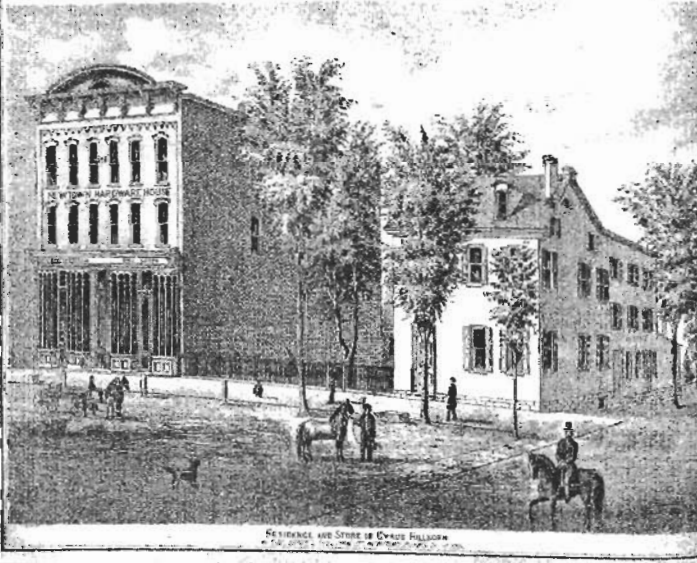
Strawberry Festival
